A Martyr for the Truth – extract from the sermon of Fr. Jerzy Popieluszko in St. Stanislaw Kostka Church, Warsaw on September 25 1982:

"Through Christ's death and resurrection the Cross - a symbol of disgrace - became a symbol of courage, virtue, help and brotherhood. In the sign of the cross today, we embrace all that is most beautiful and valuable in man. Through the cross, we go on to resurrection. There is no other way. The trial of Christ is still going on. Christ is being tried in the person of his brothers. Only their names and faces, the dates and places of their birth, has changed. The methods change, but the trial of Christ goes on. What a likeness there is today between Christ bleeding on the cross and our own unfortunate country! Like Christ on the cross, our country is bleeding from her wounds. Her sons are being deprived of honour and dignity, are humiliated and often downtrodden. Christ was killed on the Cross by His own countrymen in His own country. Today our brothers are also being killed by their fellow countrymen. How many crosses we could name that our nation has had to bear. Our greatest cross is the lack of respect for basic human rights. In our country human rights are not respected because thousands of people are still in camps and prisons. It is the cross of our country that for years there has been a strange desire to deprive people of God - especially the young - and to inflict an ideology which has nothing to do with the thousand-year-old Christian tradition of our nation. Another cross is our lack of truth. Such is the nature of truth that it comes to light, however scrupulous and planned are the attempts to hide it. The cross is also the lack of freedom. Where there is no freedom, there is no love, no friendship between members of the family, within the nation, or between nations. It is not possible to love or form a relationship with someone by force. Poles cannot be won by threats. Everyone of us here today could name an endless number of crosses which he or she has experienced personally or witnessed, especially during the last ten months, months of constant anxiety, ill-treatment and fear, months with an uncertain future. But Christ is with us, and therefore the crosses of our country, our personal crosses, and those of our families, must lead to victory, to resurrection, if we are united with Christ, who conquered the Cross."

We will be marking it during the evening Mass that day and by showing the DVD of the play about him, "Ksiadz", which was presented here in 2011, the next day in the centre at 5.00pm.
